Pastor's Ponderings

My pondering this month was inspired and adapted from an incomplete internet article, by an unknown author.

All of us, no matter how careful we try to be, bring interpretive bias to the Bible when we read it, or hear it read. Unless we recognise our inherent tendencies and have some nous we will fail to mitigate these biases.

There's a cultural bias that gives us presuppositions & predispositions that differ from those of the writers and audiences of antiquity. Bridging the time, geographical, and social distances between us and the Bible writers and initial audience is a monumental task. Most of us also bring an implicit theological bias to our Bible understanding. We look through the glasses of our denominational/theological perspective & tend to see what confirms what we already believe, while almost subconsciously ignoring what challenges our preconceptions.

Modern Christianity suffers from a bad case of what I like to call "hero theology bias". As each individual reads Scripture, they identify themselves with the hero in every story. They are Esther, but never Xerxes or Haman. They may be Peter or John, but never Judas. They are the woman anointing Jesus, or washing his feet with tears, but never are they the Pharisees. They are the Jews escaping slavery, never the Egyptians.

In the modern so called first world to see ourselves as Israel and not Egypt, or Esther and not Haman when studying Scripture is a perfect example of hero theology. And it means that as people with real or relative privilege, wealth and perhaps power, we have no lens for locating ourselves rightly in Scripture or society - and it makes us blind and ill-equipped to engage issues of power and injustice. It behoves us to remember that we were once "the other", we were once the "outsider".

Hero theology bias is very weak Bible work, it gives us a false sense of entitlement, and it severely hampers our mission work in our communities.

"I have a problem with the Bible. Here's my problem...

I'm an ancient Egyptian. I'm a comfortable Babylonian. I'm a Roman in his villa.

That's my problem. See, I'm trying to read the Bible for all it's worth, but I'm not a Hebrew slave suffering in Egypt. I'm not a conquered Judean deported to Babylon. I'm not a first century Jew living under Roman occupation.

I'm a citizen of a superpower. I was born among the conquerors. I live in the empire. But I want to read the Bible and think it's talking to me. This is a problem.

One of the most remarkable things about the Bible is that in it we find the narrative told from the perspective of the poor, the oppressed, the enslaved, the conquered, the occupied, the defeated. This is what makes it prophetic. We know that history is written by the winners. This is true — except in the case of the Bible it's the opposite! This is the subversive genius of the Hebrew prophets. They wrote from a bottom-up perspective."

Uniting Church in Australia 17th Triennial Assembly

What is Assembly? Assembly is one of four councils of UCA. The others are Church Council, Presbytery, and Synod. These councils are not hierarchical, but have different responsibilities. Assembly meets only every three years, and is the national council. It has a Standing Committee that deals with Assembly business when Assembly is not in session.

The 17th Assembly met in Parramatta 11-16 July - over 200 people and six days of joyful Christian community, worship, prayer and discerning the will of God for the Uniting Church in Australia.

The meeting's most significant moment took place on the first day, when the Assembly installed its 17th President, Rev Charissa Suli, in a jubilant celebration at a packed St Stephen's Uniting Church in Sydney.

In two other major leadership decisions, the meeting elected Rev Dr Paul Dongwon Goh as President-elect of the Uniting Church in Australia, and appointed Andrew Johnson as Assembly General Secretary.

Amongst joyful daily worship and community time, the meeting passed several proposals on Act2, Continuing Witness, transgender, intersex and gender diverse people, Net Zero, and the Beneficiary Fund.

Act2 is an in-depth survey and report into the health and vitality of the Uniting Church, carried out over the past 2 years through church councils, presbyteries and synods. The final report was presented to the 17th Assembly and makes interesting reading. https://act2uca.com/ It looks at existing structures and governance to identify whether they are fit-for-purpose as we move into the future.

Another important resolution at Assembly was that UCA recognises that transgender, gender diverse and intersex people are beloved by God and full members of the Body of Christ in baptism and invites congregations and councils of the Church to welcome and honour them, and the gifts and skills they bring to all aspects of the Church's life, including worship, leadership, and social justice advocacy."

As a local congregation here in Dayboro, it is good to know what is happening nationally, as we continue to evaluate who we are and where we are going in the future.

Church Council News

When your Church Council meets in August, it will be considering further nominations to Council to help manage the workload of the team. It will also be looking at reports on Insurance which for all churches is a rising cost. Our survey for the Synod on which they base the premium calculations has shown that we have a lot of contents worth covering but the advice is to make an estimate of what is our priorities in the event of a devastating event. Contents is a small part of the insurance cover with the building being the major part. Synod gathers valuations on all of its facilities which amounts to billions of dollars and then provides the total to a number of companies who bid for the church's insurance. After choosing the company to cover the churches, schools and hospitals, each church is given an allocation related to its value. We should know our figure by late October. We will closely monitor this in the years ahead.
